Gowramma Ramaiah silver Medal for best dissertation.



Cosmetic Gynaecology: A new way of enhancing a woman's personality



Cosmetic gynaecology is a relatively new concept.

Plastic surgery procedures are common on the face and other parts of the body to make someone look and feel young. Rejuvenating a dry vagina, say, after childbirth, menopause is for better living in women's health.

Pregnancy, childbirth and ageing cause structural changes in the vagina like vaginal laxity, leakage of urine and gaping of external genitalia.

We, at Ramaiah Memorial Hospital, have been helping patients gain more confidence by doing a vaginal rejuvenation to make a woman feel more fit and normal. Since we now live in a society that accepts and participates in taboo topics of a woman's body, vaginal health is now discussed in more fore and family circles. It becomes easy for the doctor to understand what the patient wants and chalk out a plan for her.

Cosmetic gynaecology is the combination of procedure of non-surgical/ minor surgical procedures which leaves a faint scar. It is a simple procedure. It is non-invasive and painless. Treatments through laser, radiofrequency, injection of platelet rich plasma and creams are some of the procedures adopted. One does not have to be admitted in the hospital. You will be treated as an outpatient and you can go back home and relax.

However, a surgical procedure does happen when the vagina becomes lax after childbirth or due to ageing. Tightening of the vagina also becomes necessary if there

is a frequent infection in the urinary tract, sexual dysfunction and urine drops during coughing. You need to consult a doctor when you have irritation and pain in the vagina due to excessive sweating.

In short:

When do you consult a cosmetic gynaecologist?

- · If you feel your vagina is lax after childbirth
- If there is any discomfort or burning sensation in your vagina.
- · If there is an odour or soreness in the vaginal area
- If you tend to leak urine when you cough/sneeze/laugh/cycle/lift heavy weights
- · If you suffer from a prolapsed uterus
- If you have pain during intercourse
- · If there is vaginal bulging and vaginal discharge

These conditions generally occur due to tissue ageing and laxity, menopause, pregnancy and childbirth, low oestrogen and lifestyle habits like smoking and alcohol and obesity.

- Laser
- Radiofrequency
- Injection PRP

Shape your dream nose with Rhinoplasty

hat is Rhinoplasty?

Rhinoplasty is a surgery that changes the shape of the nose. The motivation for rhinoplasty may be to change the appearance of the nose, improve breathing, or both.

The upper portion of the structure of the nose is bone, and the lower portion is cartilage. Rhinoplasty can change bone, cartilage, skin or all three. The size and relationship of the bone and cartilage determine the size and shape of the nose. Rhinoplasty can be used to reduce the size of the nose, change the shape of the tip or the nasal bridge, narrow the opening of the nostrils, change the angle between the nose and upper lip, correct a birth defect or injury, or help to releive nasal breathing problems.

Each surgery is unique and customized for the specific anatomy and goals of the patient.

Who may benefit from a Rhinoplasty?

- Bumps on the nose
- Drooping tip
- Widened bridge
- Nostril size discrepancy
- The disproportionate shape of the nose
- · Correction of a birth defect
- Deformity from a previous injury

It is preferred to wait until the nasal bone has finished growing, around the age of 18 years, to make any changes to the nose.

What to expect at your first clinic visit:

The plastic surgeon will speak to you and gain information and insight into what you feel you would like to improve in your nose. We will ask you questions on whether you have headaches, cough, cold, nasal congestion and will dive deeper into what exactly you hope to see after surgery. Then, we schedule the surgery on a day that is convenient for you.

What are the risks for a Rhinoplasty?

 As with any major surgery, Rhinoplasty carries risks such as:

- · Adverse reaction to anaesthesia
- Bleeding
- Infection
- Other possible risks specific to Rhinoplasty include:
- · Difficulty breathing through your nose
- · The possibility of an uneven-looking nose
- · Pain , discoloration, swelling that persists
- Scarring
- Need for additional surgery
- What are the preoperative procedures?
- Routine blood and urine test
- Cardiac work up

What to expect the day before the surgery?

You will get admitted the evening before the surgery. We ask that you take a head bath in the evening. Your surgeon will meet you and take some preoperative photos. We will tell you to not eat or drink after dinner so that your post-anaesthesia time is well tolerated. We will remind you that after the surgery, you will have a pack in the nose and will have to breathe through your mouth immediately after the surgery.

What to expect on the big day?

You will take a bath in the morning. We ask that you use no face oils or makeup and that you keep your hair tied up in a knot at the top of your head. Remember, no morning coffee or water today. You will then be taken to the operating room an hour before the procedure and we will meet you there.

What will happen during the surgery?

General anaesthesia: you will receive the drug by inhaling it or through an iv line in your hand. General anaesthesia affects your entire body and causes you to be unconscious during the surgery. You will need a breathing tube, which will be removed at the end of the surgery.

Rhinoplasty may be done inside your nose or through a small external cut at the base of your nose between your nostrils. Your surgeon will readjust the bone and cartilage underneath your skin. The surgeon can change





the shape of your nasal bones and cartilage in several ways. For small changes, the surgeon may use cartilage from deeper inside your nose or from the back of your ear. For larger changes, the surgeon can use cartilage from your rib or implants. After these changes are made, the surgeon places the nose's skin and tissue back and stitches the incision in your nose.

After the surgery, you will be in a recovery room where the staff monitors your return to wakefulness.

What can I expect after my surgery is done?

After the surgery, you need to rest in bed with your head propped up. Your nose may be congested from the nasal pack placed, so you will have to remember to breathe through the mouth. One of the most important things is to keep ice packs close and continuously place them over the cheeks to reduce any bruising or swelling. The next morning, we will slowly wet the pack with a local anesthetic and gently remove the pack, followed by steam inhalation and nasal drops. You will have the splint still over your nose when you go home.

What care should one take at home?

- Avoid strenuous activities such as the gym or running.
- Do not wet the face and hair, a head bath can be done in spa style with the hair in a bowl behind you

- Care for the nasal dressing by keeping it dry and secure. If for any reason, the nasal dressing comes loose, please get in touch with your surgeon.
- Multivitamin tablets should be taken daily to help with the healing process
- You will continue steam inhalations and nasal drops
- You will take a five-day course of oral antibiotics as well
- After one week, you will visit the surgeon for suture removal and inspection.

When can one see the result?

You will see a change once the nasal dressing is removed. However, it will take a period of 6 months to one year to fully visualize the result due to swelling.



Kudos to the team Cardiology The Saga of 50th Heart Transplant



Ramaiah Narayana Heart Centre has achieved a significant milestone by successfully completing its 50th heart transplant surgery. A 42 years old, male patient had been suffering from end-stage heart failure for several months and was in need of a suitable donor heart. An 18-year-old boy who was declared brain-dead in a road accident donated his heart. The Surgery was successfully conducted by the team, led by Dr. Nagamalesh U M, Head of Cardiology, Ramaiah Narayana Heart Centre and Dr. Ravishankar Shetty, Chief Consultant Cardiothoracic Surgeon.



In 2016, I began my journey as a runner and have since completed numerous marathons and ultra-marathons. However, my recent participation in the World's highest marathon held in Leh, at an altitude of 11,555 feet, was a unique and challenging experience, where I ran 42.2 km. As a chronic asthmatic patient, the decreased oxygen levels at such high altitudes made me apprehensive. The route itself was scenic, with stunning

ACTIVE BLEEDING CONTROL (ABC)

India accounts for the highest number of global deaths in road accidents. On average, 1,50,000 people become victims of road accidents according to the statistics given by Road Transport and Highway ministry. The percentage of fatalities between the ages of 15 and 45 years stood at 69.80% for the year 2020.

An accident victim with life-threatening bleeding can die before reaching a medical centre. As a witness and a bystander to the incident, each one of us should be trained to actually control the external bleeding, a lifesaving skill till medical aid arrives/victim is shifted to a medical faculty. There are three types of bleeding. Arterial bleeding causes the spurting of bright red blood with each heartbeat of the victim. It is usually the cause of most severe blood loss. Venous bleeding occurs due to damage to veins and can cause rapid blood loss. Capillary bleeding usually causes minor blood loss due to the trickling of blood from capillaries.

The Emergency Department of the Ramaiah Medical College in collaboration with the University

of Pennsylvania Institute, Paediatric Simulation Training and Research Society, (pediSTARS), GVK Emergency Management Research Institute along with Dr. Vinay Nadkarni, Medical Director of the Institute of Simulation and Advanced Education and innovation at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia have launched the "Active Bleeding Control" (ABC) training programme in Bangalore, Karnataka.

ABC programme is designed to empower bystanders to be equipped to help a victim with a bleeding wound till professional help arrives or is available. In this hands-on interactive training, one learns to identify life-threatening bleeding, how to appropriately apply a compression dressing, wound packing for continued bleeding wounds in spite of compression and as a last resort tourniquet application to stop the uncontrolled bleeding. By learning these three auick steps compression-packing- tourniquet application, one can effectively control external bleeding in someone with life-threatening bleeding. Unlike external bleeding, internal bleeding can be equally serious. One should be aware of the signs of shock and ensure the victims reach a medical centre well within the golden hour.

Active Bleeding control conducted by the Emergency Department of Ramaiah Memorial Hospital is a training program similar to the "Stop the Bleed" campaign in the USA. This training was started to make the citizens better prepared to save the lives of victim who has severe bleeding wounds. By taking the course one can become empowered to make a difference when a bleeding emergency occurs and one can save a life by ABC.
